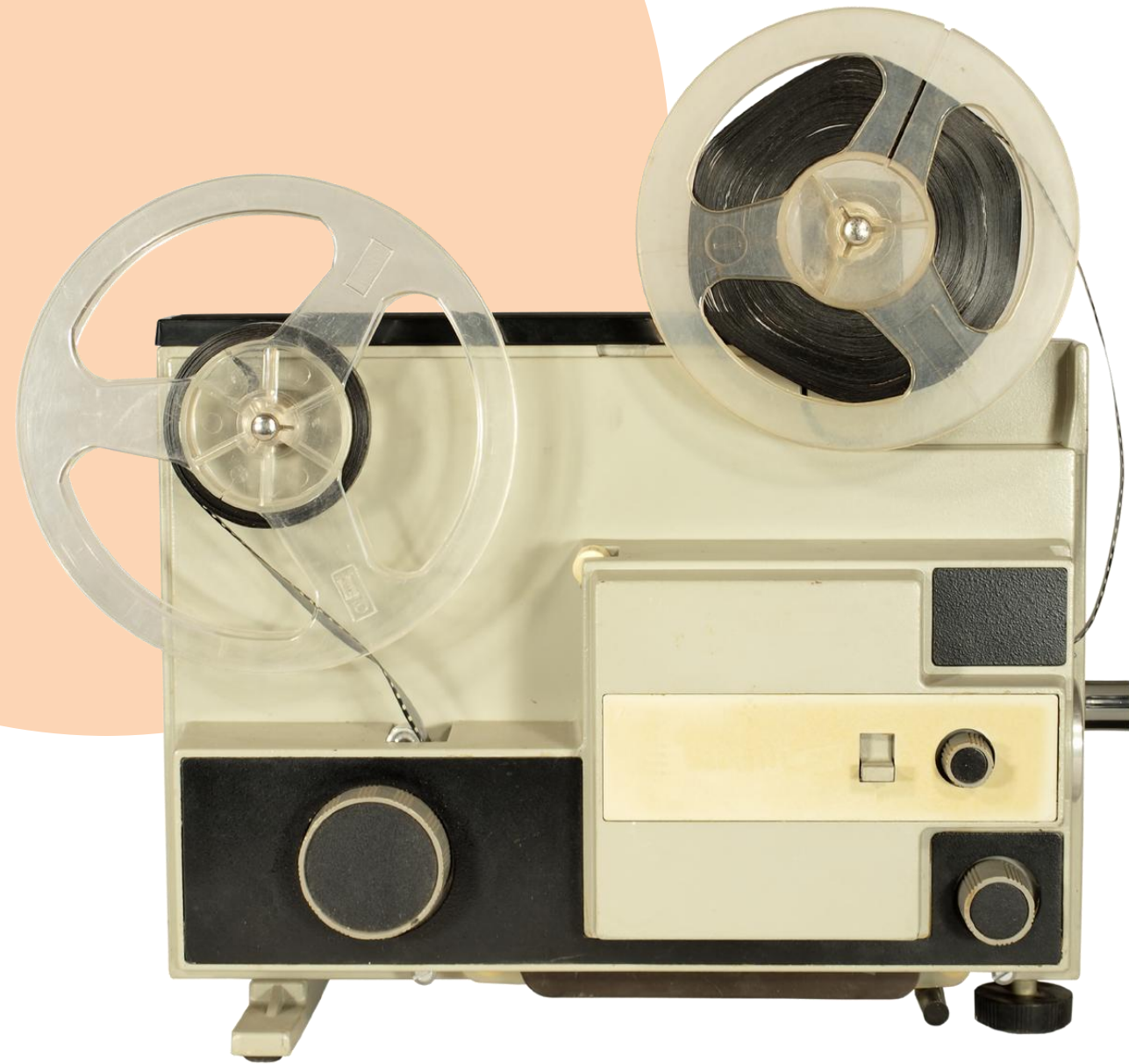

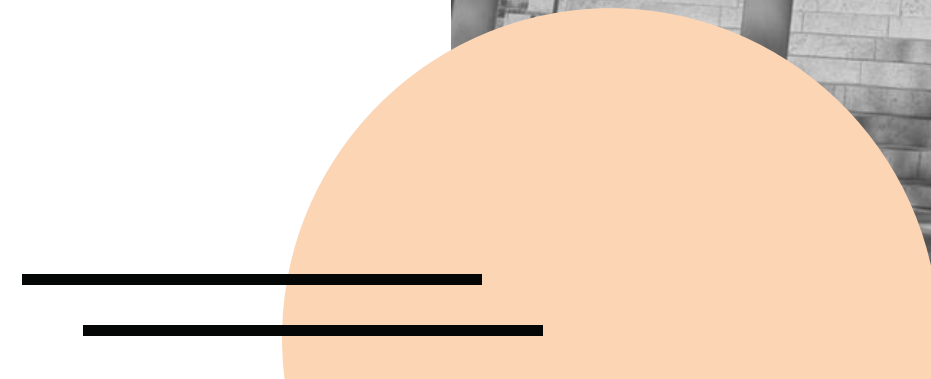

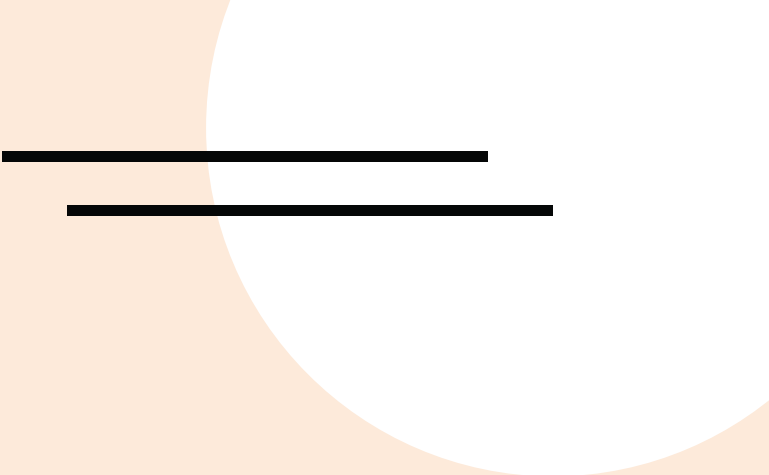

WHAT IS THE SEATTLE MUNICIPAL ARCHIVES?

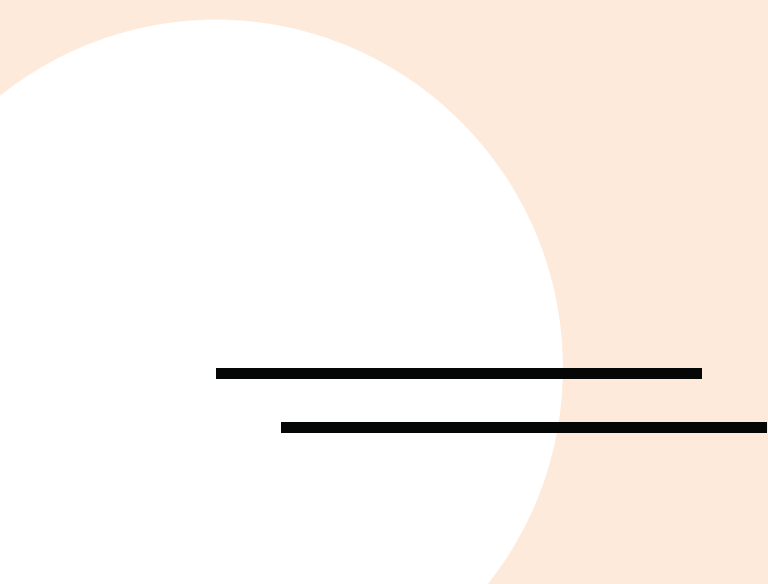
SMA's holdings document the history, development, and activities of the agencies and elected officials of the City of Seattle. (That is, records created or received by City government.)

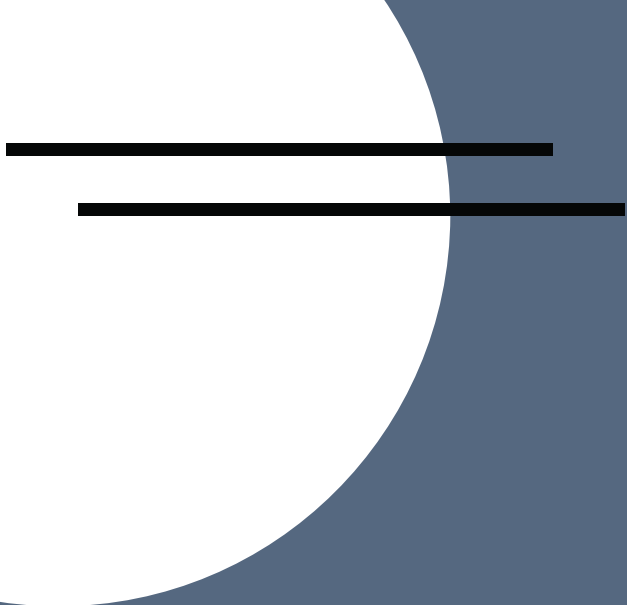

Collections Overview

SMA is home to over 30 moving image collections, which combined contain over 12,000 items in a wide variety of film, videotape, and born-digital formats. Over 8600 items are cataloged and over 6600 of these are currently digitized, available to stream and download on SMA's website.



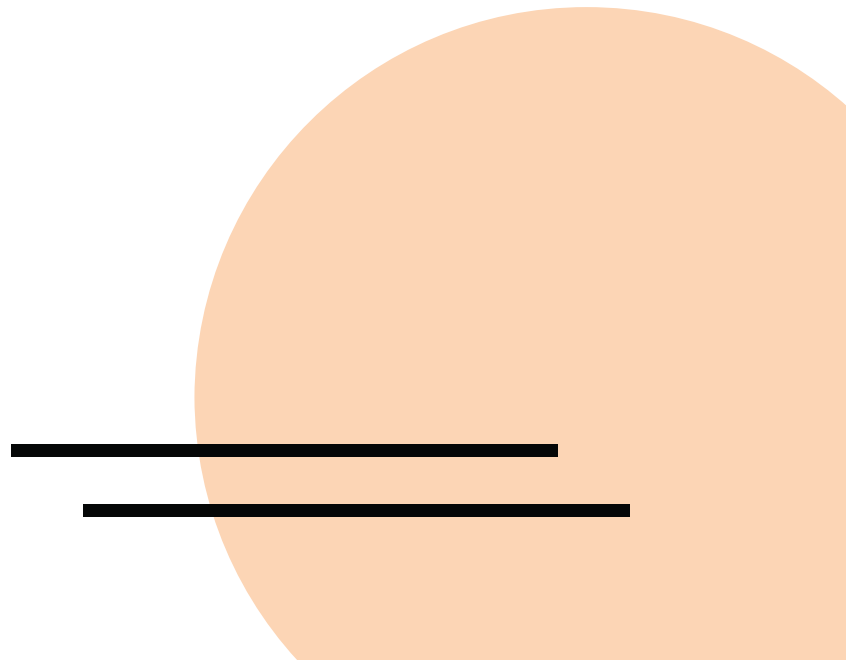

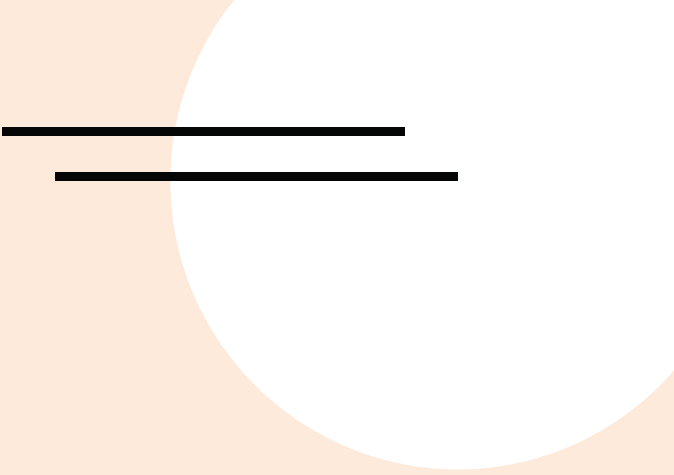
COVERAGE DATE RANGE

CONTENT CREATION CONTEXT

Although some moving images in SMA's collections are cataloged as covering dates as early as 1869, most of these are presentations or documentaries that use still images, maps, documents and historical information from that time period. The earliest moving image recording at SMA was recorded in 1909.

Moving Image Content

Moving image collections are made up of productions and footage created by City departments documenting projects, employee training, public service announcements and outreach, meetings, celebrations, and events. Our four largest collections include:



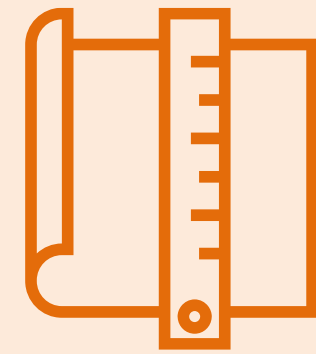

Seattle Channel 1985– 2016

The Seattle Channel collection is comprised of events filmed and productions created by the Seattle Channel, including raw footage and programming. Content features series and special features highlighting the diverse civic and cultural landscape of Seattle such as public affairs; government meetings and press conferences; arts coverage; news/lifestyle magazine shows; community features; and panel discussions and interviews with local leaders and national figures. Recordings include b-roll, raw footage, and public service announcements, as well as final productions.

Video coverage of select Seattle City Council meetings, forums, and public hearings from 2000 to 2008 for which no separate audio recording exists can be found in this collection.



Seattle City Light 1929 - 2011

Moving images created by Seattle City Light depict various activities and facilities at the department. The footage includes finished productions, raw footage, and outtakes. Public service announcements are also included and cover subjects about electricity conservation and safety, and City Light's apprenticeship training program. Other footage documents the history, planning and construction of various projects including substations, transmission towers, the Skagit Hydroelectric Project, and the Lighting Design Lab.

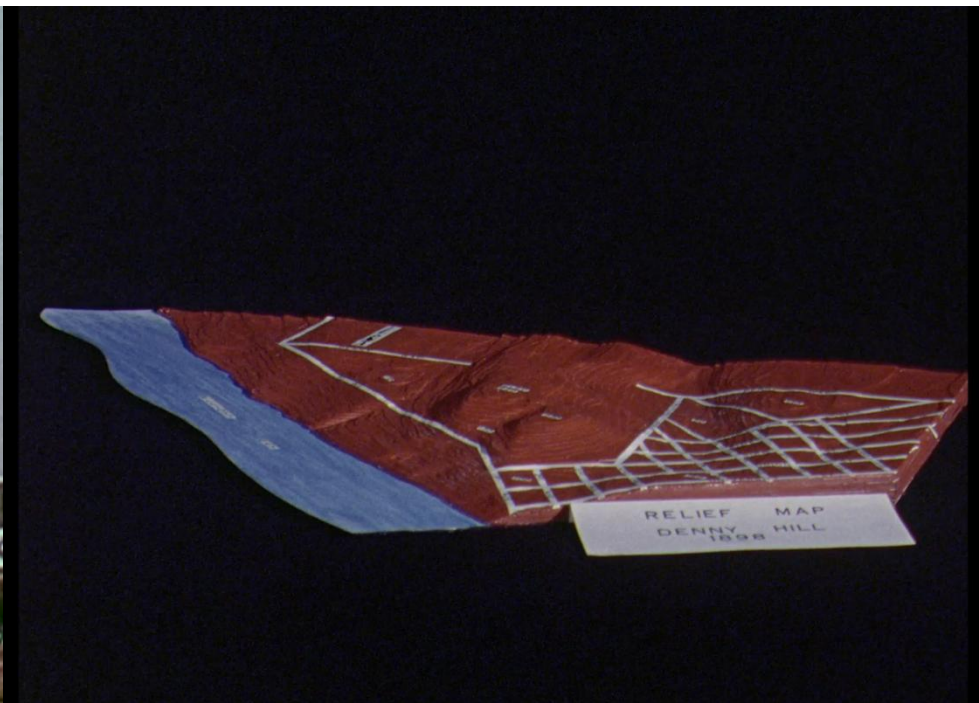
Workplace culture at the department is illustrated through a variety of mediums including training videos, employee recognition, awards programs, celebrations, employee forums, and video newsletters including Switches, Connections, Network on TV (NTV) and Netline.



Seattle Engineering Department 1909 – 1999

Moving images created by Engineering Department primarily document various engineering and public works projects between the 1920s and 1990s. Content includes raw footage, outtakes and B-roll, as well as final productions of documentaries, public service announcements, training videos, special reports, community and departmental celebrations (such as groundbreaking ceremonies, grand openings, and awards presentations) and a few films that could be classified as home movies.

Transportation planning and construction are heavily featured, including various bridge, freeway, traffic control and street projects in Seattle. Specific projects of note are the Ross and Diablo Dams, the Tolt River Watershed, the first and second Denny Regrades, Fremont Bridge, University Bridge, Ballard Bridge, the Alaskan Seawall, the Alaskan Way Viaduct, and the West Seattle Bridge.



Seattle Fire Department

1940 – 1988

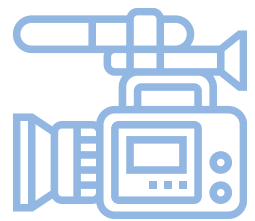
Moving images created by or for the Seattle Fire Department, primarily from the 1960s through the 1980s. Topics include public service announcements, footage of training exercises, recruitment spots, fire safety and prevention education, and coverage of local fires, as well as departmental participation in public events and celebrations.

Of special note are the School and Fire Safe Education (S.A.F.E.) program films. Between 1977-1988, the Seattle Fire Department's Public Education Office produced a series of original animated films as a component of their fire safety and prevention curriculum which was presented by the Fire Department in King County elementary schools.

Seattle City Council

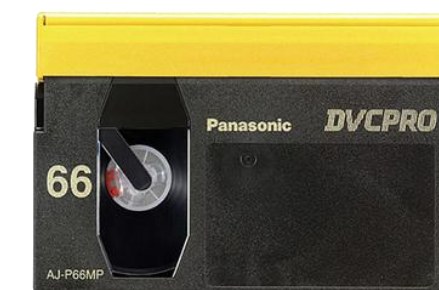

ANALOG-TO-DIGITAL TRANSFERS

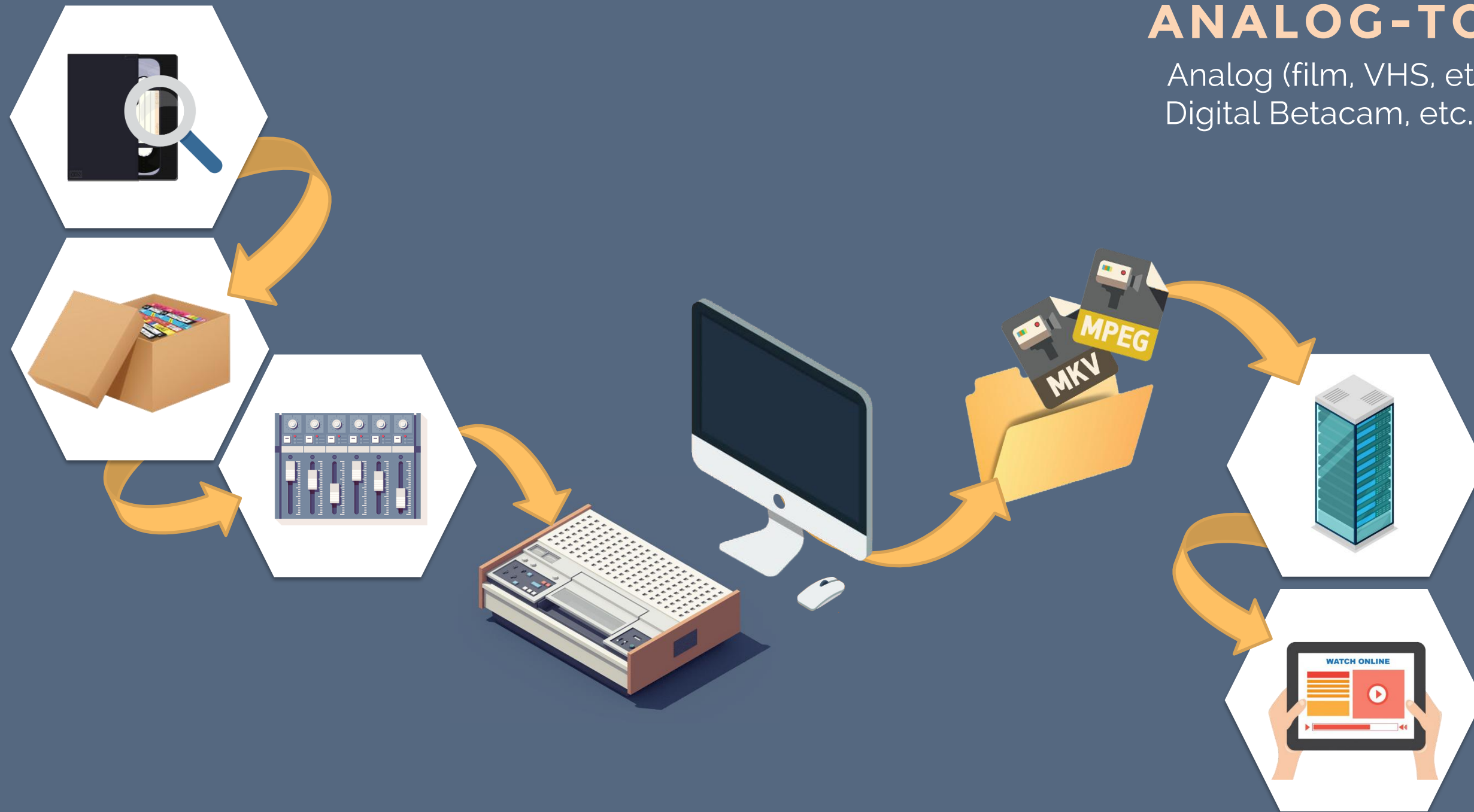
Analog (film, VHS, etc.) and analog-digital recordings (DVCAM, Digital Betacam, etc.) that have been transferred to digital files are transferred or digital moving images.

BORN DIGITAL

Born digital moving images were recorded via a digital camera.

DIGITAL FILES

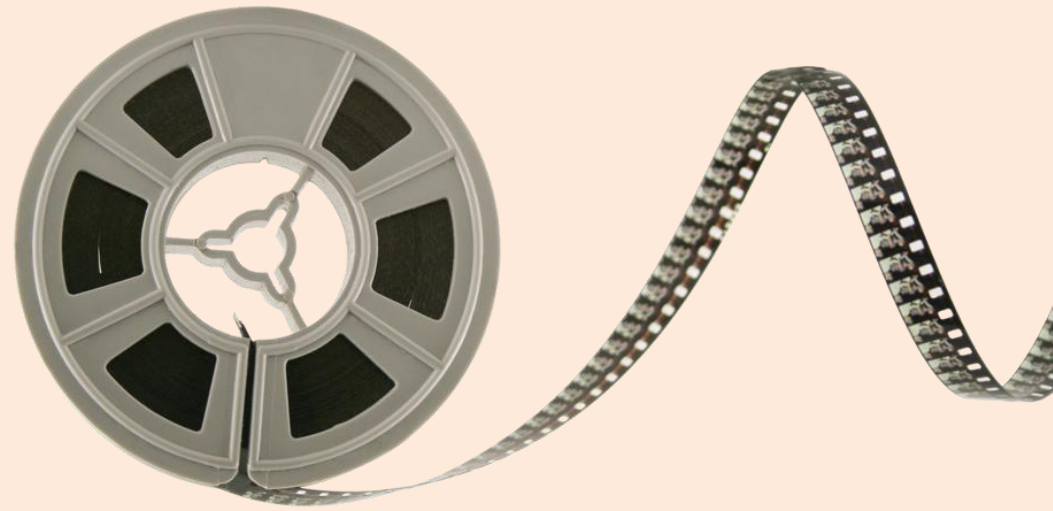
Not all moving image records in SMA's collections are available in a digital format. If a moving image has an associated file, it will be available for playback and download in Digital Collections.

Digital Collections

Moving images are individually cataloged in Digital Collections. If a digital copy of the moving image is available, it will be included in the catalog record. Files can be downloaded directly from a catalog record.

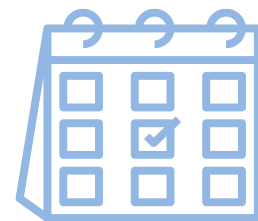

Search Types

BASIC & ADVANCED SEARCHING

There are two ways to search for moving images in Digital Collections: Basic Search and Advanced Search. Basic Search (shown here) will cast a wide net and search results will include more than film and video recordings.





Advanced Search

The [advanced search form](#) allows you to limit your search to moving images only, and also has options to search by date, subject, type of footage, and other fields.



Streaming

If a digital copy is available, you can watch moving image recordings, by clicking play the play button on the video player. For recordings longer than 30 minutes, allow the page to load for a few minutes prior to playback or download. Video quality varies based on original format.

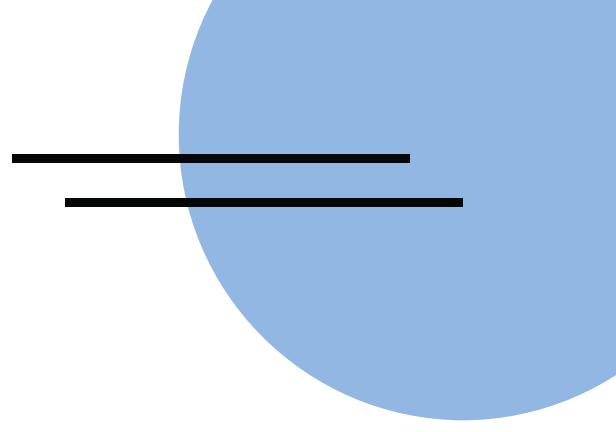

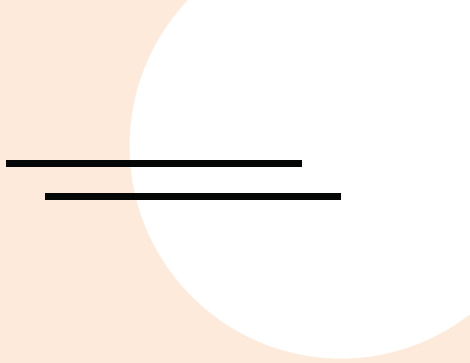
Downloading Files

There are two methods for downloading moving image files from Digital Collections. Before downloading, make sure the video file has fully loaded in your browser.

1. Click the download button at the top left of the video player.

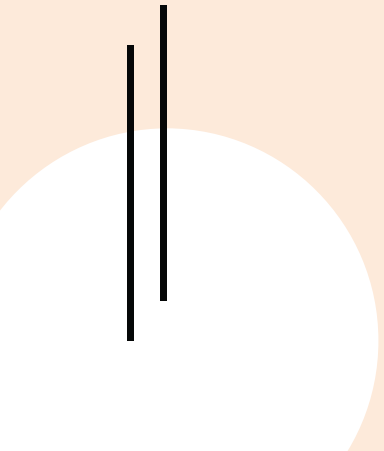
2. Right click on the video and select "Save Video As"

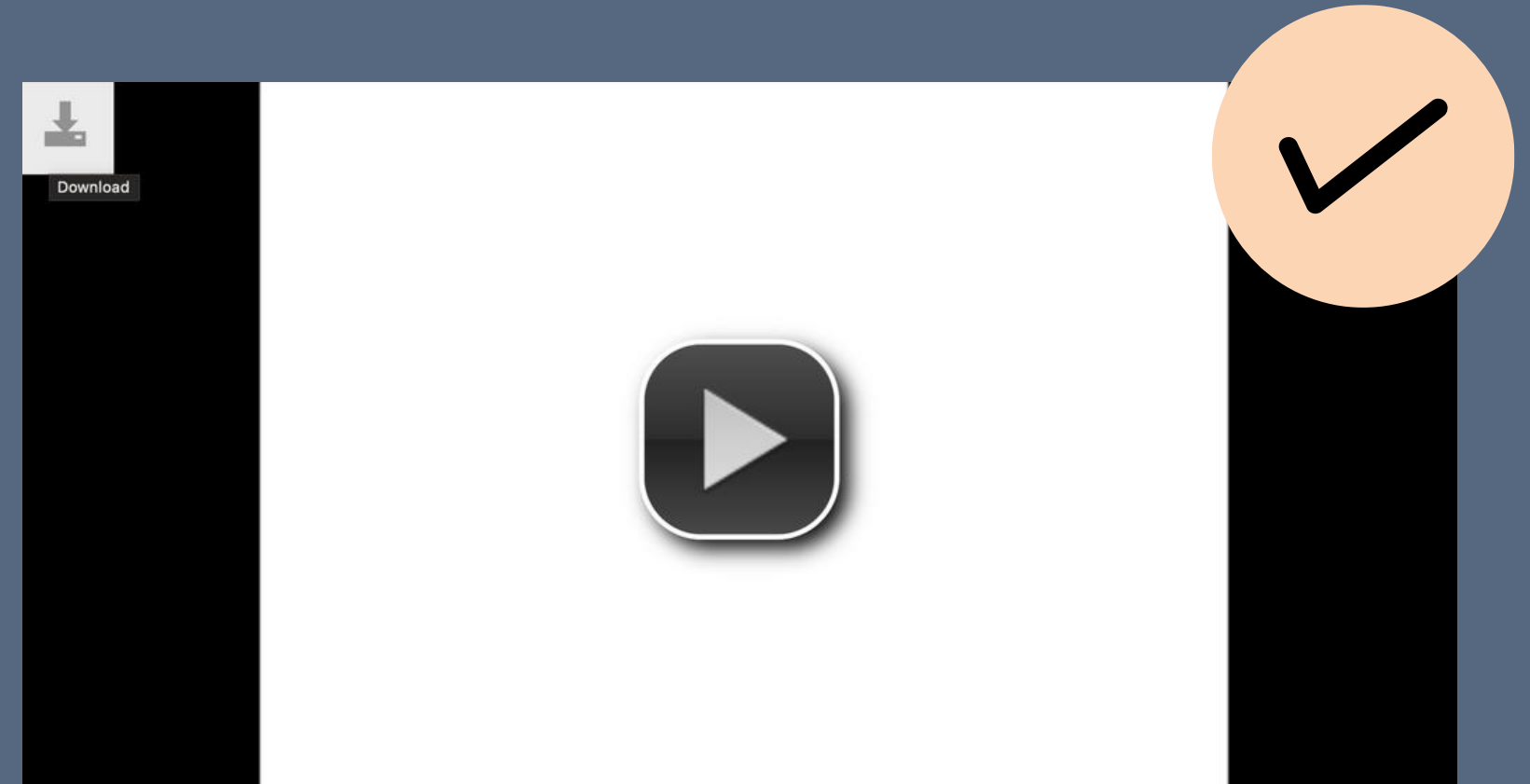
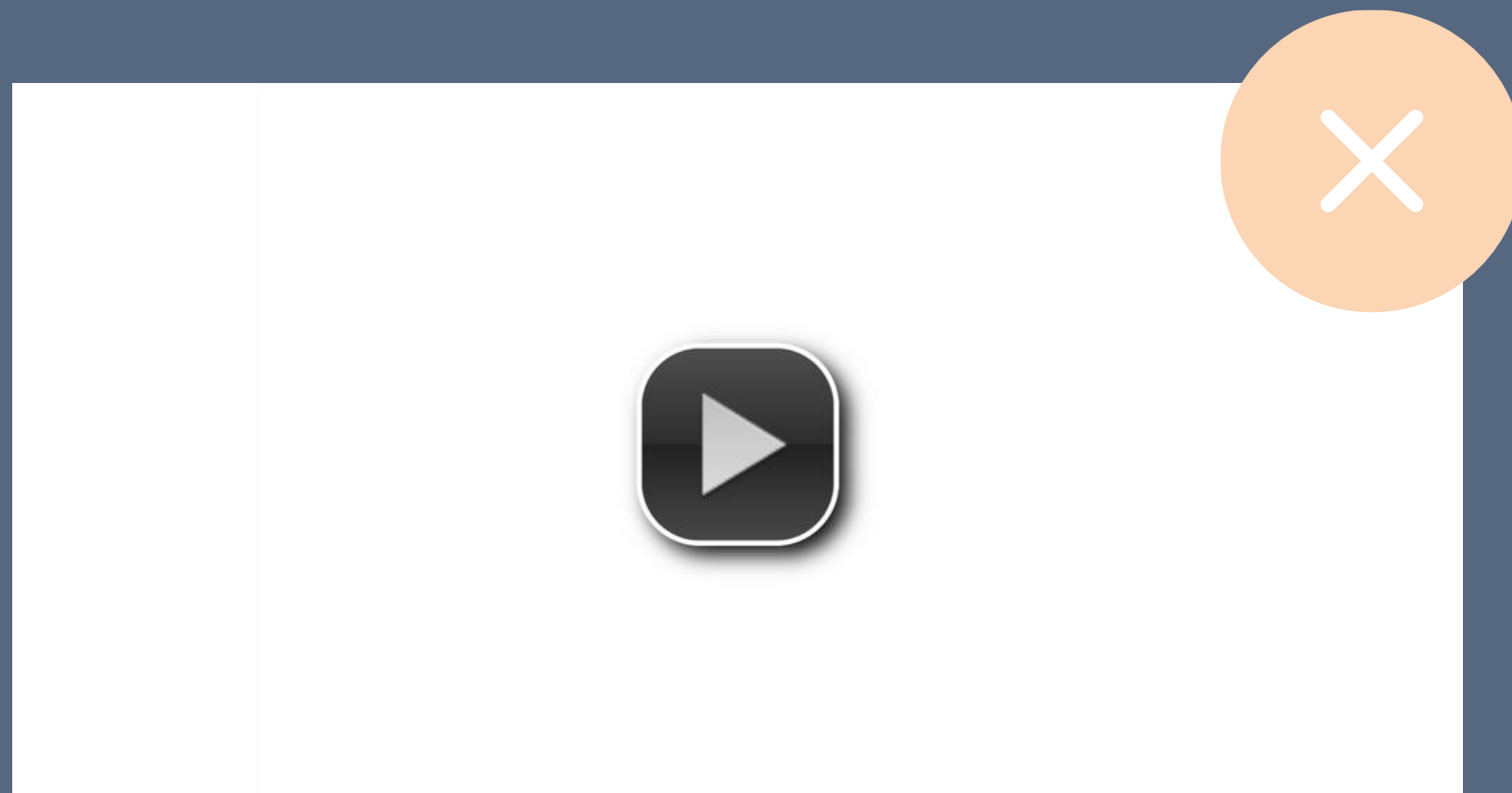
TROUBLESHOOTING DOWNLOADS

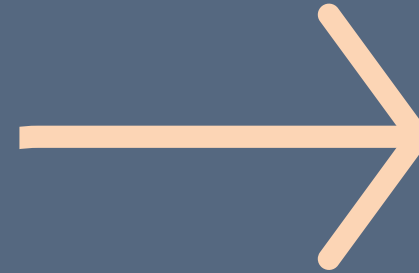
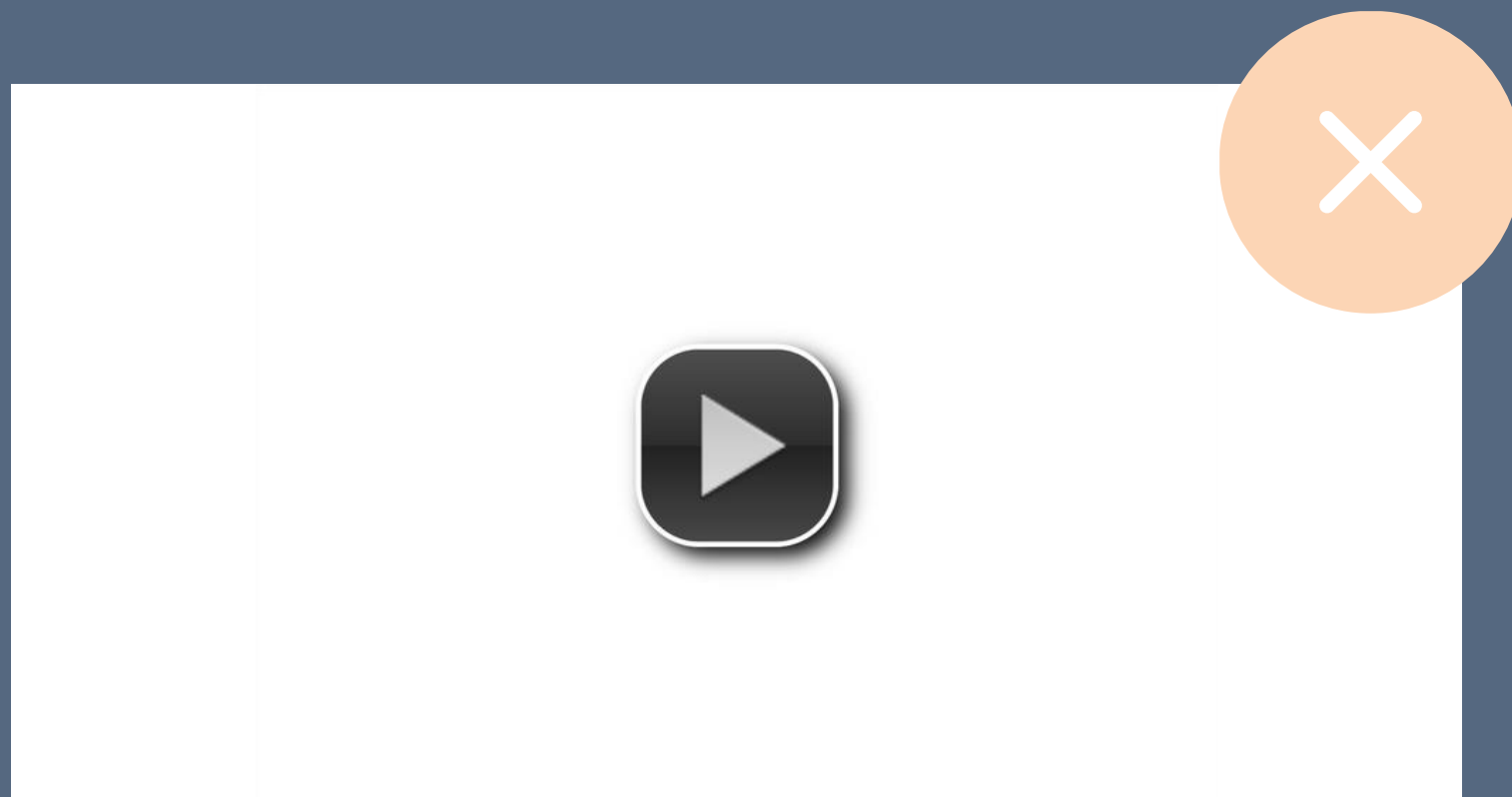
If you are having issues with a download (either where the file will not download or the download is incomplete), there are several troubleshooting steps you can try:

- wait a few minutes and try downloading again
 - refresh the page, wait a few minutes and then try downloading the file again
 - try downloading the file the alternative way than your first attempt
 - try closing completely out of your browser, reopen and try again
 - check Internet Archive
 - contact us at archives@seattle.gov to request a copy

Transfer of analog film and video to digital files continues on an ongoing basis.

To limit your search to only records that have been digitized, apply the "has digital object" filter to your results.





How do I get copies of moving images without a digital file?

JUST ASK US!

If you come across a moving image that does not currently have a corresponding digital file, you can request that it be transferred by contacting the Archives at archives@seattle.gov. Include the item identifier number or a link to the catalog record.

Not all moving images can be digitized in-house. We can transfer most of the videotape formats in our collections, but cannot process film on site. Film materials will need to be sent to a local vendor for capture (fees apply; please contact us with any questions or requests for film transfers).



Can I get a hi-res copy of a video with a digital file?

JUST ASK US!

If you would like to receive a higher quality copy of a moving image that currently has a corresponding digital file, you can request a file by contacting the Archives at archives@seattle.gov. Include the item identifier number or a link to the catalog record.

Hi-res copies will be delivered in SMA's preservation format for moving image recordings:

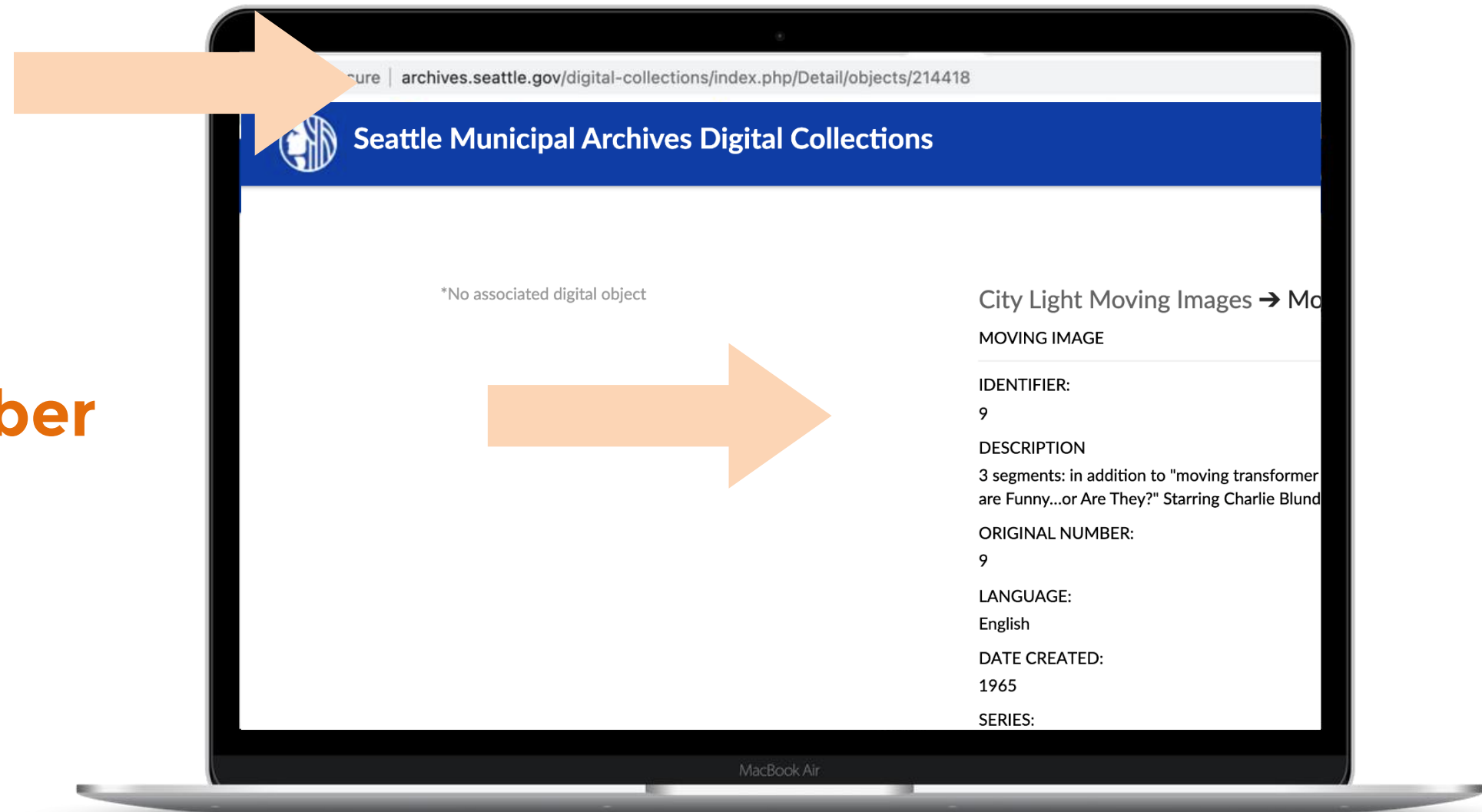

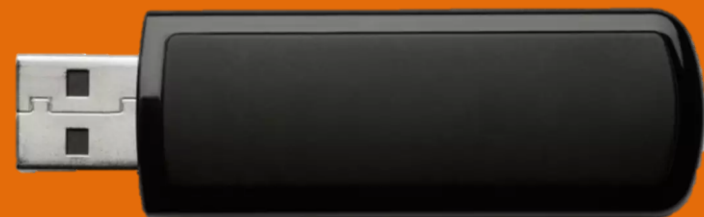

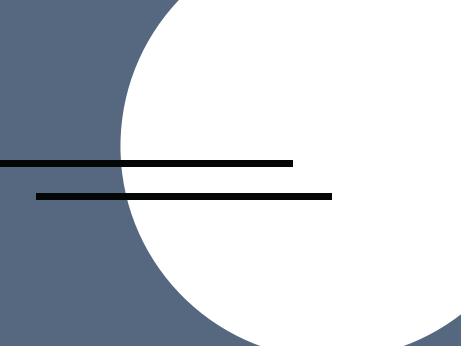




Analog-to-Digital Transfers

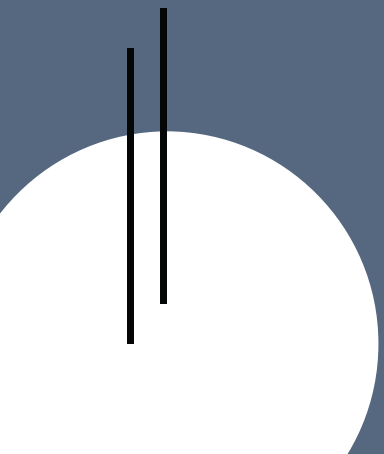
PROCESSING & DELIVERING DIGITAL COPIES

A film or video must play back in real time to be transferred to a digital format, meaning if a meeting is 6 hours long, the recording will need to play for 6 hours in order to be captured as a digital file. Depending on the length of the moving image you request, it may take a few days to receive a copy. For more details about this process, please see our [Virtual Tour for audiovisual materials](#).

There are a few methods to locate specific moving images not found in your search results:

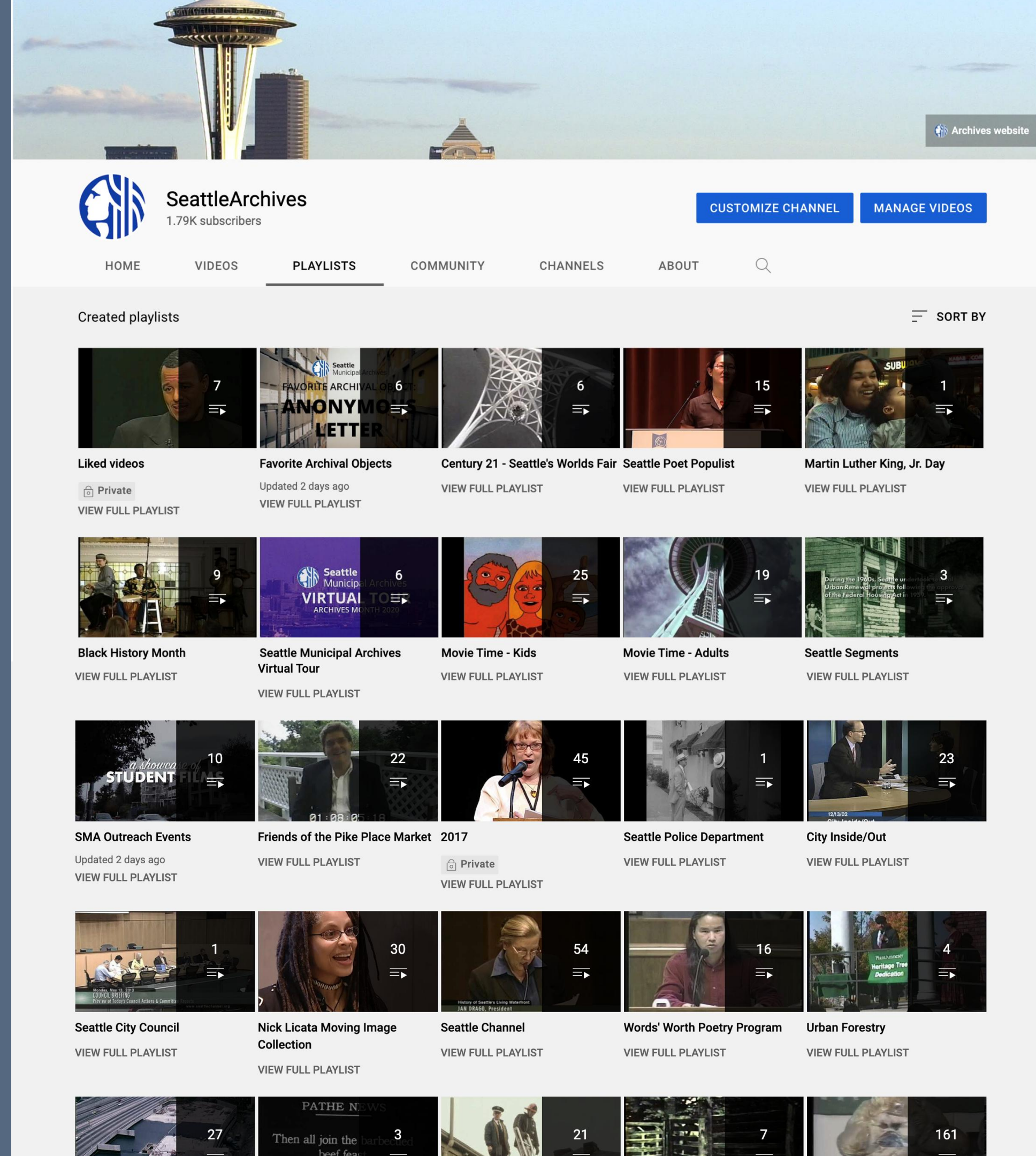

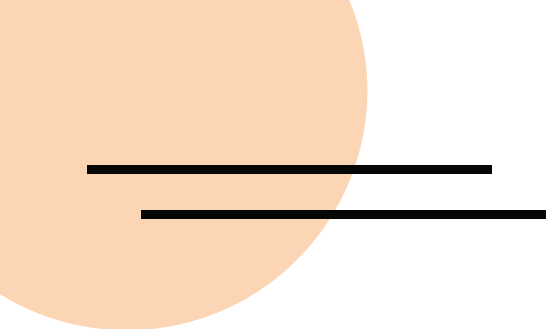
Seattle Segments

MULTIMEDIA EXHIBITS

SMA holds records created by or for City agencies and elected officials, including moving images, photographs, textual records, maps, and audio recordings. Context and the interrelatedness of the records is an important concept when using the records for research.

Seattle Segments use a variety of formats to explore pieces of Seattle's history and this interconnectedness. Excerpts from moving images and audio recordings are woven together with photographs and textual records in these short pieces and provide an opportunity for a deeper exploration into topics than is possible with one format alone. Resources for additional research are listed for each topic. Topics include:
